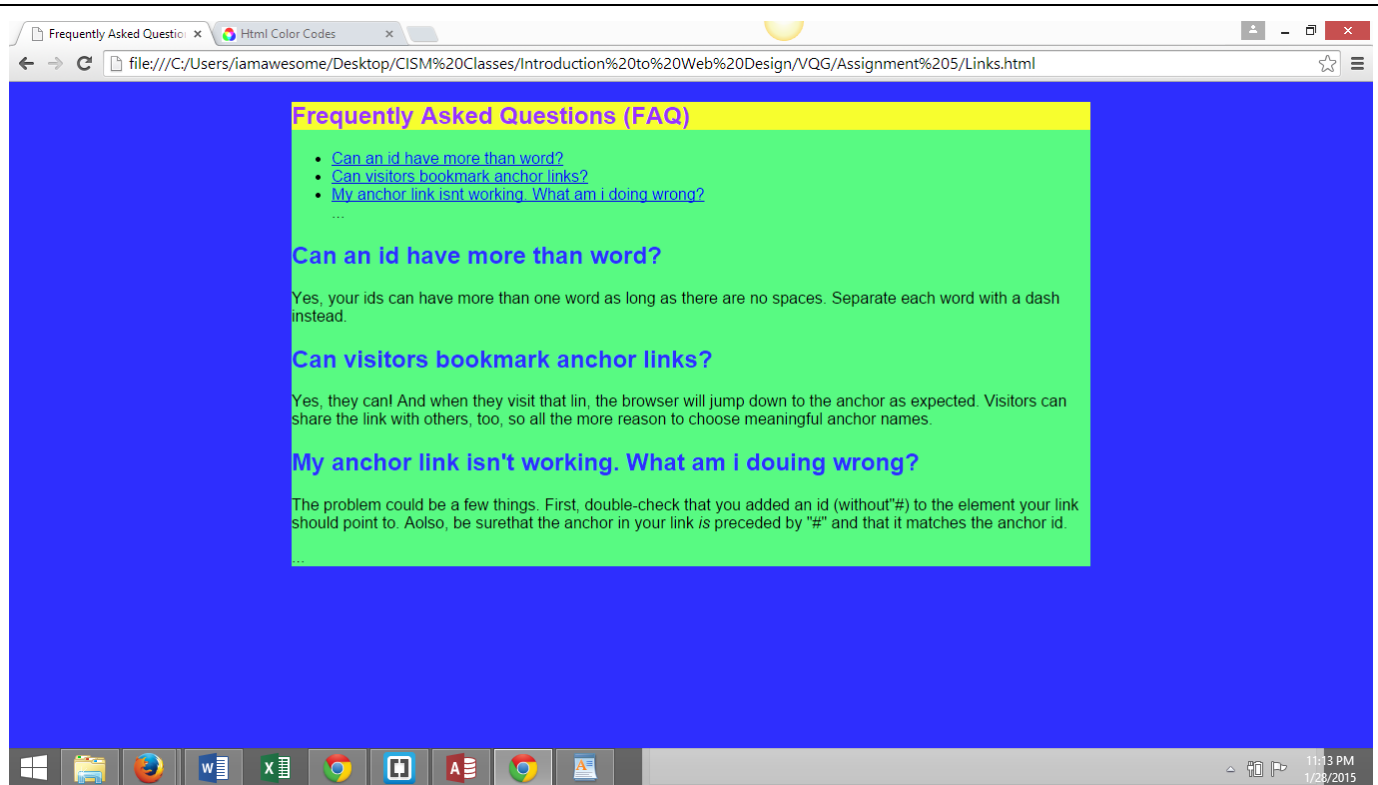

PART 1: Chapter 18 Links: Read pages 157-168 of the VQG textbook to answer these questions.	
1. Describe each of the following terms that relate to links in HTML:	
<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Destination – describes what will happen when a user clicks the link this is attached to. 2. Anchor link – A link that redirects to specific section of content within your web page. 3. Label – This is the text that is highlighted to signify a link, and is what the user will read/hear. 4. Tabindex – This is a changing the way the tab button behaves on a web page. This is not necessarily recommended because it can be difficult for readers and puts the information that they hear out of order. 5. Block-level link – Wrapping a link around an elements or a group of elements. 6. Target attribute – This is when you tell the browser how to behave when interacting with a link. A link can be opened in a new window or tab instead of being accessed on the current window that is open. 7. target =”_blank” – This causes a link to always open in a new window despite how many times the link was pressed. 8. Mailto: attribute – The command to point a link at an email address. 9. Tel: + attribute – The command used to point a link at a phone number. 10. Thumbnail image – Points the link at an image to be opened. 	
2. Why does the textbook discourage using Click Here as a link label?	
<p>The textbook discourages the use of Click Here as a link label because it is a generic tag. It does not give the reader who is skimming your page any idea as to what the purpose of the link is. This tag requires heavily on the user reading the surrounding text to attempt to identify what the purpose of the link is, in most cases they will not do this and will just skip over the link. This also makes it difficult for users using a reader. Lastly not all users will click to activate a link, as there are other ways to interact with the links.</p>	
3. Why does the textbook discourage using the target attribute to make the link open in a new window?	
<p>Using the target attribute takes away choice and control from the user, by telling the page to open in a new tab or window. This also causes problems in that the user will not always know where to look for a link or what to do to find the link if they are new to computers and are not aware of the ability to use multiple windows.</p>
